I. COVID INFORMATION:

II. COURSE INFORMATION

A. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Prerequisite: 3 hours of accounting or consent of instructor. Introduction to utilizing the computer in maintaining accounting records with primary emphasis on a general ledger package.

B. LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. The student will utilize an application software to perform accounting tasks.
- 2. Maintain records
- 3. prepare reports
- 4. analyze reports for a business entity.
- 5. Complete a comprehensive project

- 6. Explain the components of general ledger software.
- **C.** <u>STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES ASSESSMENT:</u> This will vary and is geared towards Task Stream and WECM standards. This course will be assessed on an annual basis.
- **D.** <u>ATTENDANCE POLICY</u>: Attendance is required for this course. It is scheduled to meet two times per week and roll will be taken by the instructor at every schedule class period.

This is a class in which student attendance is required. If a student stops attending class, they WILL BE DROPPED and receive a grade of "X" after <u>SIX</u> unexcused absences EVEN IF they continue to complete assignments.

Any student not present at roll taking will be marked absent unless <u>prior</u> arrangements have been made. Class will begin PROMPTLY at the scheduled time.

The Blackboard software used to manage this online course tracks student logins, tracking when and where the student has been in the course. Accessing this course on a regular basis is extremely important in order to meet the objectives of this course. You will feel more at ease with the materials if you stay in touch with what is going on. This course is 3 semester credit hours. For this reason, you should set aside a minimum of 6 hours per week to work on this course. One of the very first things you should do is set aside time each week to work on the class. It is very easy to put off attendance in an online course.
