Online Assignments

Homework is assigned to facilitate your understanding of the material. Homework is done online and can be found through the class Blackboard on the "Course Content" tab. Assignments are separated as: Week # > weekly assignment/chapter materials. We will be using Cengage MindTap to complete homework, quizzes, and exams. MindTap is a subscription for Cengage Unlimited, and the course key is automatically added by Blackboard. All assignment due dates can be found on the MindTap website, as well as on the published Class Schedule. If you do not have internet access, you need to find time to go somewhere where it is available (i.e., SPC or Public Library). The MindTap homework manager will show your grades up to date. You have 48 hours to dispute any online grades by emailing your instructor. After this time, no grades will be disputed.

Attendance

Successful completion of Business Principles is affected by contribution to the course. If a student chooses not to complete the assignments and actively work on learning the material, minimum course objectives cannot be met and the student should withdraw from the course. It is the student's responsibility to drop the course.

Attendance will be graded, and students are allowed 4 absences per semester. Attendance is required for the full class period (1 hr. 15 min.). The instructor is not responsible for removing you from the course if you cannot maintain the course schedule. Students who enroll in a course but have never attended by the official census date will be administratively dropped.

Course Grading Policy

Permission to make up missed worked will only be available if an unavoidable reason for class absence arises (i.e., documented illness, official trip authorized by SPC, or official activity). Exam Policy

There will be 4 major chapter exams, <u>plus</u> the comprehensive final exam. The lowest of the 4 major chapter exams will be dropped. A student may be exempt from taking the final exam <u>if</u> none of the 4 major chapter exams have been missed and the student has an "A" average prior to the final exam.

Exams will be conducted online, using the Cengage MindTap platform. Exams will have a time limit, and deadlines for completing the exams will be posted on the Blackboard Class Schedule. **No makeup exams will be allowed.** If a student is unable to complete the exam in the specified timeframe, he or she will not be allowed to make up the test unless arrangements are made <u>prior</u> to the test window. Class Schedule

Academic Course Guide Manual (ACGM)

This course provides a survey of economic systems, forms of business ownership, and considerations for running a business. Students will learn various aspects of business, management, and leadership functions; organizational considerations; and decision-making processes. Financial topics are introduced, including accounting, money and banking, and securities markets. Also included are discussions of business challenges in the legal and regulatory environment, business ethics, social responsibility, and international business. Emphasized is the dynamic role of business in everyday life.

Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify major business functions of accounting, finance, information systems, management, and marketing.
- 2. Describe the relationships of social responsibility, ethics, and law in business.
- 3. Explain forms of ownership, including their advantages and disadvantages.
- 4. Identify and explain the domestic and international considerations for today's business environment: social, economic, legal, ethical, technological, competitive, and international.
- 5. Identify and explain the role and effect of government on business.
- 6. Describe the importance and effects of ethical practices in business and be able to analyze business situations to identify ethical dilemmas and ethical lapses.
- 7. Describe basic financial statements and show how they reflect the activity and financial condition of a business.
- 8. Explain the banking and financial systems, including the securities markets, business financing, and basic concepts of accounting.
- 9. Explain integrity, ethics, and social responsibility as they relate to leadership & management.
- 10. Explain the nature and functions of management.
- 11. Identify strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats of information technology for businesses.

Blackboard & Cengage

The Blackboard software used to manage this online course tracks student logins, tracking when and where the student has been in the course. Accessing this course on a regular basis is extremely important to meet the objectives of this course. Ideally, students should <u>daily</u> check the semester schedule, e-mail, and check for announcements and fellow student discussions.

This course is not 100% self-paced—there will be deadlines. You will feel more at ease with the materials if you stay in touch with what is going on. This course is 3 semester credit hours in a hybrid format. For this reason, you should plan to work on about one (1) full chapter per week, to successfully complete the material. It is very easy to put off assignments in a hybrid course.

All communications and grading for this course will be conducted through "Course Messaging" on Blackboard, or you can email the instructor. Additional resources are listed under "Course Resources."

The online Cengage MindTap platform has ample material to help you gain an understanding of the assigned content. Each chapter includes videos, power points, and more. Please allow yourself time to exercise these resources when working on your assignments and studying for your exams.
