A student is clear to return to class without further assessment from DeEtte Edens, BSN, RN if they have completed the 5-day isolation period, symptoms have improved, and they are without fever for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication.

Students must communicate with DeEtte Edens, BSN, RN prior to their return date if still symptomatic at the end of the 5-day isolation.

### ALL EXAMS WILL BE COMPLETED ONLINE THROUGH BLACKBOARD.

On scheduled exams days, there will be no in-person class held. Students can choose to take the exam from any location where they are able to access a computer. The exams will be available in Blackboard for a specific amount of time, they will be timed, once a student opens the exam they will not be able to close their browser until the exam is complete. The exam questions will be randomized so that no 2 students will take the same exam.

Special Requirements: If you miss an exam, you cannot make it up, but your optional CUMULATIVE final exam can be used to replace either your lowest score or an exam you missed. If you miss more than two exams, you will be asked to drop the class.

## Projects/Assignments:

**Writing Assignment (100 points):** A topic will be presented related to a mental health disorder which impacts our society currently. For example, a discussion paper might be introduced asking you to explore how healthcare workers may be at higher risk for PTSD during the pandemic. Additional instructions and a rubric will be provided before the 8<sup>th</sup> week of class. The paper will need to follow APA writing guidelines. **Semester project (200 Points):** In an effort to demonstrate an important aspect of biopsychology, neuroplasticity, students will choose one of the five areas below to track efforts in learning (or relearning). Over the course of the semester, you will create 2 weekly "blog" entries documenting your efforts in learning a new skill. One of the weekly entries must contain a short video (less than 5 min) tracking your progress. At the end of the semester, students will write a 1-2 page summary of their experience in learning a new skill which will include: their reactions to their progress, discussion about any barriers to learning, and an overall evaluation of their new skill set. The points for this project will be divided over the weekly blogs (100 points) and the summary paper).

Skill Areas:

- 1. Playing a new video game or board game
- 2. Learning the basics of a second language
- 3. Learn an art technique (knitting, painting, drawing, ceramics, etc)
- 4. Learning a new exercise technique (Zumba, yoga, kick boxing, etc)
- 5. Learn the basics of an instrument
