Course Description

A survey course of the major phyla of the animal kingdom. General principles of animal physiology, cytology, genetics, anatomy, ecology, embryology and adaptations are stressed.

• Specific course materials available include: PowerPoint lectures, messages and announcements from the instructor, quizzes, assignments, study aids, etc.

Policies, Procedures, and Rules

This course will be conducted according to the policies and procedures of the South Plains College Student Handbook and General Catalog.

Attendance-

- Punctual and regular lecture and lab attendance is required of all students. Lecture + lab = one class session.
- Open door policy: if you do arrive late <u>quietly</u> take your seat. You may not make up any work that was missed. Excessive tardiness will not be tolerated and may result in withdrawal from the course (**3 late arrivals exceeding 10 minutes = 1 unexcused absence**).
- In the case of unexcused absence, the student will receive a 0 for the work submitted that day and it is the student's responsibility to obtain missed notes from classmates.
- When unavoidable situations such as illness, weather, an official college-sponsored trip, or a death in the family causes absence, the student may make up the missed class work as long as <u>documentation can be provided</u>. The student will have <u>one week</u> from the date the makeup work is assigned to turn it in for credit.
- A student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive (4 unexcused absences or **more**) and the minimum course objectives cannot be met. The instructor is required to initiate a student's administrative withdrawal when the student has missed every class period for two weeks excluding holidays. If you stop showing up to class after exam 2, it is your responsibility to drop the course. If you have not dropped by the official date, I will drop you with a letter grade of an "F". • Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after his/her official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the <u>first meeting of the class</u>. A student who does not attend a class by the 12th day of classes will automatically be dropped from the course and receive a grade of "X".

Students who miss multiple classes typically fall so far behind that they are unable to catch up and their grades suffer on that section of material. Set yourself up for success; attend class.

Communication is important: if you have an excused absence or emergency, contact me ASAP by email or by calling my office phone and leaving a voicemail. The faster you provide documentation, the sooner I can get your makeup work to you or schedule a makeup exam.

Hazardous Weather Policy- South Plains College rarely cancels classes due to weather. Students should plan accordingly to be able to attend all classes and arrive at SPC Levelland safely. Announcements concerning cancellations and/or delays are made on local television, radio and MySPC.

Assessment

Exams- There will be five exams (including the final). These exams will assess your knowledge of the covered material including all lecture and lab material and assigned reading from the photographic atlas. Lab exams will be incorporated into the lecture exams or will be conducted as a lab practical in which students are required to identify organisms or anatomical structures. Any student who misses an exam will have a 0 score entered for that exam.

- Make-up exams will be given *only* in the event of serious illness, a legitimate emergency, or death of an immediate family member; in each case, the **appropriate documentation must be provided** to the instructor.
- I will only consider allowing a student to make up an exam if they have contacted me **before** the exam has begun.

Group Project- You will have one group project that will be averaged with your exam grades. This semester, the project will be a 10-12 minute presentation over an endangered animal. Participation is required.

Quizzes- You will have weekly quizzes covering lecture and lab material (10 total). Quizzes will be given on Blackboard (available Wednesday afternoon and due the following Sunday at midnight). Each weekly quiz will cover the lecture AND lab material. Quizzes have already been scheduled and are listed in your syllabus.

- The lowest weekly quiz grade (1) will be dropped before the final quiz average is calculated at the end of the semester.
- Quizzes CANNOT be made up if missed for any reason.

Assignments- Assignment grades will include laboratory exercises, taxonomy flow charts, online assignments over current topics of interest, etc.

Grades

Final grades for the course will be calculated on a weighted scale: exams + group project (65%), quizzes (20%), and assignments (15%).

***Course Average**: Calculated by the average of the five grades indicated. If a student's final average *is less than* one half a percentage point away from the next higher letter grade, the instructor will consider giving the higher letter grade. There are NO curves in this course.

Course material is broken up into five exams to reduce the amount of material that you need to know for each exam and to break the material up into cohesive groups. The final exam is not comprehensive, I repeat, THE FINAL EXAM IS NOT COMPREHENSIVE.

Final grades are not curved, because:

- 1) I drop your lowest quiz grade.
- 2) I provide bonus questions on each exam.
- 3) I provide extra credit opportunities throughout the semester.

Academic Integrity

It is the aim of the faculty of South Plains College to foster a spirit of complete honesty and a high standard of integrity. The attempt of any student to present any work as their own which he or she has not honestly performed is regarded SPC as a most serious offense and renders the offender liable to serious consequences, possibly suspension. - Plagiarism violations include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - 1. Turning in a paper that has been purchased, borrowed, or downloaded from another student, an online term paper site, or a mail order term paper mill;
 - 2. Cutting and pasting together information from books, articles, other papers, or online sites without providing proper documentation;
 - 3. Using direct quotations (three or more words) from a source without showing them to be direct quotations and citing them; or
 - 4. Missing in-text citations.
- Cheating violations include, but are not limited to, the following:

- You may NOT record the lectures (I will do that for you) or take photos/videos of the instructor.

My electronics policy may seem strict but it is my experience that students who are distracted during class (texting, listening to music, online shopping, etc.) don't do as well as students who are actively paying attention. In fact, most students who have earned a D or an F in this class have been consistently absent or distracted during class. This is YOUR education for YOUR future that YOU are paying for, please come to class prepared to work; I will do the same.
