LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- Apply a method of sight singing to more difficult tonal melodies, oral demonstration of complex rhythms
- Classify more difficult elements of music, including extended tertian chords, compound interval and non-diatonic scales
- Transcribe more complex rhythms and diatonic and non-diatonic melodies
- Transcribe and analyze diatonic and chromatic harmonies
- Read and reproduce rhythms in various meters, including syncopation and irregular beat divisions

METHODS OF ASSESSMENT OF LEARNING OUTCOMES

- o Singing diatonic melodies and melodies with chromatic alterations
- Dictation
 - Rhythmic: All meters with emphasis on tied notes, dotted rhythms and subdivision of the beat
 - Melodic: Diatonic with introduction of chromatically altered note

ATTENDANCE AND PREPARATION

Enrollment for this class allows for all students to meet all together while maintaining safe social distance guidelines. Lectures will be provided in a face to face format, while simultaneously being available on Blackboard Collaborate. Lectures will be recorded in case the student is not able to watch the live stream of the lesson. We will work on assignments and dictation in class while simultaneously making the most of the online resources available with your textbook.

For this semester, attendance will not be a part of the overall final grade. Participation is KEY to success in this course. If a student has not attended class, not logged in to Blackboard, not turned in multiple assignments, and not contacted the instructor for 3 weeks, the student may be administratively dropped from the course.

We will work face to face as much as possible. I would like to use Sight Reading Factory so that we are not singing together in a small space (singing is one of the worst offenders of spreading Covid 19). There may be days where I schedule students to come at staggered intervals in order to sing sight reading exercises live with only me in the room to practice safe social distancing. A calendar will be given to you soon.

ILLNESS

Each student will be given a specific topic to teach the class this semester. Students can teach their topic face to face, via livestream, or have a prerecorded presentation. Presentations should last at least 10 minutes and should be creative and interactive (with proper social distancing and safe practices of course). More guidelines will be given in class.

FINAL PROJECT

At the end of the semester, the class will present one final sight singing project. This will most likely be virtual and I would love to do one song as a class, rather than separate solo videos. It will be a sight-reading virtual choir. :) We will discuss this in further detail in class.
