Course Description: This course is a study of the functions performed in the American system of state governments, with special reference to the development of governance in Texas and its Constitutions. This course satisfies the Legislative requirements for teacher certification.

Course Purpose: Government 2306, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and intergovernmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the state of Texas.

- 8. Analyze issues, policies, and political culture of Texas.

Exams (60%)

There are three exams (including the final exam), and comprising 60% of your final grade. The third exam will be given during the final exam period and is not cumulative. Furthermore, all three exams will consist of multiple-choice and short answer questions. I will provide you with a scantron on exam day.

If you miss class on exam day for an unexcused reason, you will have to take the make-up exam. The make-up exam will have different questions from the normal exam, and I will automatically deduct 15 points from your exam grade as a late penalty. Finally, you are not allowed to the final exam earlier than the scheduled date in the syllabus.

Participation (15%)

Active participation is crucial to your success in this class and, more broadly, to the success of any learning experience. There will be numerous opportunities throughout the semester to participate by engaging in class discussions and completing participation assignments. Moreover, I expect you to show up to class on time and be ready to participate. At the end of the semester, you will receive a participation grade based on the quality of your participation (e.g., participating in discussions, completing in-class assignments, attending class, and adhering to classroom decorum).

Your attendance will be documented, and you will get a low participation grade if you do not regularly attend class. Furthermore, I reserve the right to deduct points from your participation grade for excessive unexcused absences, violations of classroom decorum (e.g., tardiness, cell phone/ear bud use, or other disruptive behavior). If you have questions about your participation grade throughout the semester, you are welcome to ask me for feedback on how you are doing.

Essay (10%)

For this assignment, you will write a persuasive essay to a fictitious newspaper editor (letter to the editor) in which you give your opinion on a current issue in federal politics. More information on this assignment will be provided to you later in the semester.

Quizzes (15%)

I will assign at least 8 quizzes throughout the semester. Each quiz will have between 5-15 questions and cover material from the readings and lecture. Under normal circumstances, you will complete a quiz in Blackboard, but I might assign a pop quiz in class. At the end of the semester, I will drop your two lowest quiz grades.
