Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the world from 1789-modern times. Topics to be discussed with be 18th century absolutism, the Enlightenment, the French Revolution, the Industrial Revolution, Imperialism and Colonialism, WWI, WWII, and Globalism.

Course Purpose: To offer students a solid foundation course in the principles and important events and ideas in western civilization. This course will prepare students for further study in other social science courses, including American History and American Government, as well as British History, etc.

Course Requirements: Students should attend all class meetings, complete all homework assignments and examinations at the times assigned, complete projects in a manner consistent with college-level work, read assignments thoroughly, and be prepared for all class discussions.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Critical thinking students should demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information appropriate for a college-level course.
- 2. Communication students will effectively develop, interpret, and express their ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
- 3. Social responsibility students will demonstrate intercultural competence, a knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.
- 4. Personal responsibility students will demonstrate their abilities to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.
